Searching the Heart of the King

Week 1: My Refuge 1 Samuel 19 & Psalm 59

Series Intro

Context

- ❖ Israel cries for a king, but God says they don't need a king. When they continually persist, he gives them what they want.
- ❖ Saul is anointed king
- ❖ Saul disobeys the Lord
- ❖ God rejects Saul and anoints David (a shepherd boy) as the king, but he does not become king immediately.
- ❖ David slays Goliath
- ❖ The people of Israel fall in love with David
- ❖ David is in the service of Saul playing the harp for him
- ❖ David married Saul's daughter, Michal
- Saul's jealousy leads him to try to pin David to the wall with a spear on multiple occasions
- ❖ David and Jonathan (Saul's son) form a deep friendship

Read aloud 1 Samuel 19 (Pause to summarize as you go along.)

Key points in summary:

Verses 1-10

Jonathan's ultimate loyalty lies with David. He forsakes his royal lineage to align himself with the future king.

David continues to serve Saul faithfully, but Saul's jealousy continues to get the best of him.

Verses 11-24

Michal's loyalty is with David rather than her father.

David flees to Samuel (the head prophet of Israel).

Prophesy: "probably implies uttered words of prayer and praise to God under the influence of the Spirit"

Bottom line: God supernaturally intervenes. David's enemies come with ill intent, but they end up worshipping the Lord. Even Saul is humbled before the Lord.

David is under duress due to no fault of his own. We will look at 3 points of his response

David finds refuge in a friend that is closer than a brother.

What might Jonathan be sacrificing to help David? Saul is clearly volatile, so there is no telling how he might respond if he feels that his own son is choosing the side of his enemy.

Jonathan is in succession to the throne. If he helps David, essentially, he is giving up his seat on the throne.

Why is friendship so important?

How can we be a "good" friend like Jonathan?

David finds refuge in his trusted spiritual mentor.

Why is it important to run to an older Believer (emphasis on Believer not just some older person) rather than just run to a friend?

Are there any examples of times in your life when a spiritual mentor really helped you out?

What does it look like to find shelter in a spiritual mentor?

David finds refuge in God.

David wrote this in the midst of this situation. God is our ultimate refuge. No other refuge will suffice. We don't just run to his refuge after we seek out our brother or spiritual mentor. We run to this refuge first and foremost and continually.

Read Psalm 59 to yourself and identify different things that David prays for

What are some of elements of David's prayer to God, and what would it look like for you to pray in this way?

- ❖ Honest cry of the situation (verses 6-7, 14-15)
- ❖ Come, see, and meet me (verse 4)
 - ➤ God moves towards him
- ❖ Trust in God's just nature
- * Trust in God's strength (verses 8-9, 16-17)
- ❖ Trust in God's love (verse 17)
- Proclamation that even though his enemies come back day in and day out, he will still sing of God's strength (verse 9)
- ❖ Commitment to seek the Lord in the morning (verse 16)
- ❖ Remembrance of God's past protection and love (verse 17)

How does this passage point us to the Gospel?

Gospel

David is the rightful king of Israel. Saul is the current, rejected king, and Jonathan is the heir to the throne. Saul and Jonathan

both have a choice to make. They can either reject or embrace David's kingship.

Saul clings to power and attempts to fight the inevitable. He spends his life enviously fighting to keep his crown, and ultimately he takes his own life in battle. Jonathan embraces David. He gives up his "right" as heir to the throne. He realizes that David is to be king, submits to that truth, and he enters into this beautiful relationship with David. Will you be like Saul or will you be like Jonathan?

David would eventually become king no matter what. Saul fights it fervently, but eventually he takes his own life in battle, and then David is crowned king.

You can either choose to die to yourself and make Jesus king of your life, or you can fight it to the death. Either way, it ends with your death and Jesus as King. But with one death there is redemption. With one death there is an eternity spent in a beautiful relationship with your King, and with the other death there is an eternity subjected to his wrath.

Do you have a relationship with the true King, or are you trying to maintain control of your own life?

Week Z

Week 2: In God I Trust Psalm 56 & 1 Samuel 21:10-15

Context to 1 Samuel 21:10-15

David is on the run from Saul, and he has just left a place called Nob where the priest there gave David, and his men, rations to refresh them. He also got the sword of Goliath from the priest there. (After David cut off Goliath's head with his own sword, the sword was taken to Nob.) We will cover that story later in the semester.

Read and Summarize 1 Samuel 21:10-15

- ❖ David from Nob flees to Gath. Gath is the Hometown of Goliath
- ❖ David "took the words to heart" (words that invoked fear)
 - > What does it mean/look like to take words to heart?
- ❖ David acts crazy to protect himself.
 - ➤ Maybe he wouldn't be perceived as a threat if he is a crazy man.

This week (Psalm 56) seems to deal with David's feelings and emotions throughout this passage, and next week (Psalm 34) seems to be a Psalm of thanks for afterward.

Psalm 56

Read verses 1-2 & verses 5-6

What feelings and emotions are David conveying, and what are some things that cause us to carry those same emotions?

- ❖ Never ceasing/hopeless exhaustion ("all day long")
- Oppressed
- ❖ Fearful
- Constantly on alarm/paranoid ("they watch my steps")
- Hurt
- ❖ In constant contention ("they stir up strife")
- ❖ Inhibited direction/purpose/mission ("injure my cause")
- ❖ Feel as though his enemies' sole purpose is against him ("all their thoughts are against me for evil")

What does David do with these emotions?

❖ He takes them to God

How does he take them to God?

Honestly, unfiltered

Read verses 3-4 & verses 7-13

David does not leave it with a cry; he speaks the truths of God to himself.

- ❖ Like the hand building game. In little league, when the team puts their hands in the center to do a team shout/cheer, the kids always try to be on top. For example, I put my hand down, but then immediately someone else stacks on top of my hand. Then I will put my hand on their hand, and then so on and so on.
- ❖ David cries out, but then immediately he stacks it with truth. Then he repeats. Cry out, stack with truth, cry out, stack with truth.

What are some things that stood out to you in these verses?

Three truths that give David peace

1. What can man do?

- ❖ Practically speaking, what is the worst that can happen in the given situation?
 - ➤ List some of the student's anxieties and fears, and take them to their extreme
 - > For David, man can kill him.

Read Matthew 10:28 & Romans 8:38-39

- ➤ Yes man can kill, but he cannot bring ultimate death. God is all powerful and God is sovereign. He is in control of every single situation. We can rest in the truth that absolutely nothing can pluck us from the love of God. Translation... Even the worst of situations in this world we might face cannot bring our ultimate demise
- **❖** How can we use this truth to give us peace?
- 2. This I know, that God is for me
 - ❖ Read Romans 8:28
 - ❖ Does David trust God because He makes the bad go away? No. He trusts God because God is for him. "This I know, that God is for me."

***** How is this truth comforting?

- Questions I must ask myself: "Is God sovereign in ____?" Yes. In his sovereignty, is he working good in this situation even if I cannot see it?" Yes.
- **❖** Would anyone like to share an example of a difficult situation that God worked for good?
- ❖ In his crying out, he suggests that his enemies are

constantly close to him, but in his truth he suggests that God is closer

➤ What does it practically look like to believe that God is near, and how does that truth give us peace?

3. For you have delivered...

- ❖ Psalms often refer to specific situations the psalmist is going through while at the same time referring to the bigger Biblical narrative. David trusts in God's deliverance. Deliverance in this situation, and deliverance ultimately through the hope in a coming Messiah (Jesus).
 - ➤ What is the deliverance of the future Messiah and why was deliverance necessary? (discuss the Gospel)
- This deliverance, like David's, allows us to walk before God in the light of life.
 - The opposite would be the darkness of death. Darkness is hopelessness. Light offers hope.
 - ➤ What would it look like to "walk in the light of life" or walk in hope? (break down walk, break down hope, and then break down what it means to walk in the light of life/hope)

Take home

- ❖ We must implement this pattern into our lives. Do you feel thoughts of fear/anxiety/worry/stress creeping into your heart? Rather than "taking them to heart" lay them at the feet of Jesus, and then immediately stack truth on them.
 - Ex: God, I feel lonely and stressed. I don't know if I will ever get married, and it gives me anxiety for my

future. BUT you oh Lord are my contentment. You are enough. You know what's best for me and my life, and I will trust you with it no matter what the future may hold because I find my delight and joy in you.

- ❖ Maybe you aren't necessarily living in fear, but are you living in confidence? Where are you failing to live in the complete confidence that comes from a relationship with Jesus?
 - "Confidence in the Lord is a purposeful decision, replacing an emotional reaction to one's circumstances."

Week 3: Thank the Lord Psalm 34 & 1 Samuel 21:10-15

Context to 1 Samuel 21:10-15

Summarize 1 Samuel 21:10-15

- ❖ David from Nob flees to Gath. Gath is the hometown of Goliath
- ❖ David "took the words to heart" (words that invoked fear)
- ❖ David acts crazy to protect himself.
 - ➤ Maybe he wouldn't be perceived as a threat if he is a crazy man.

Last week (Psalm 56) dealt with David's feelings and emotions throughout this passage, and this week (Psalm 34) is a Psalm of thanks for afterward.

Read the sections together and after each section summarize the big idea.

Psalm 34:1-3

Big Idea: David is praising the Lord and inviting others to

praise him too.

What are some things that you have gotten so excited about that you couldn't stop thinking about them and talking about them to other people?

What would continual praise of God look like in your life? What if your emotions aren't there?

- Finding ways to remind yourself of God throughout the day.
- ❖ Deepening your understanding of God and what he has done for you. As your admiration, affections, and love increases, your praise, thanks, and worship will increase as well.
- ❖ Walk in obedience even when your heart isn't in it

Psalm 34:4-7

Big Idea: David explains his reason for praising God and why others should too.

What are the characteristics of God that lead David to worship?

- God is near and does not hide from me
- God hears and responds to my cries
- God cares for me
- God rejuvenates

Psalm 34:8-10

Big Idea: Fear the Lord and you will be satisfied. Try it for yourself.

What does it look like to taste and see that the Lord is good?

What do you think it means to fear the Lord?

❖ Fear the Lord is not an emotion, it's obedience.

What does it mean to have no lack?

Psalm 34:11-14

Big Idea: Walk in righteousness.

What does it mean to keep your tongue from evil and to turn away from evil?

- ❖ Speak truth
- ❖ Don't use words for deception
- ❖ Seek the welfare of others
- ❖ Seek after peace in relationships and situations

Psalm 34:15-18

Big Idea: God moves towards the righteous and rejects the wicked.

What feelings come from reading this section?

- ❖ Comfort knowing that justice will be served to the wicked.
- Comfort knowing that God is near to the brokenhearted and crushed in spirit.
- ❖ This section should bring a bit of tension to your heart. It makes sense that God punishes wickedness and engages the righteous. We all want that on some level. We enjoy watching movies/shows that have the bad guy getting punished. The tension comes from the realization that we are all wicked. We have all fallen short of the glory of God

Psalm 34:19-22

Big Idea: Affliction comes to both the righteous and the wicked, but the Lord will redeem the righteous.

Both the righteous and the wicked suffer affliction, but what is the hope of the righteous? God will deliver him.

If we are wicked, how do we become righteous? Gospel

- * Read 2 Corinthians 5:21
- **❖** Does anyone notice anything special about verse 20? Read John 19:31-37

Take Home

Reflect on what God has done for you and let it stir your heart's affections for him. As your love for God grows, give thanks and invite others to give thanks as well. Fear the Lord and trust in God's ultimate deliverance.

Week4

Searching the Heart of the King

Week 4: There is No One Psalm 142 & 1 Samuel 22:1-5

Context

David has been on the run from Saul. He was run off from his own house, and then he was run off from Gath (the hometown of Goliath). In Gath he was fearful for his life, so he acted crazy. Now he has left Gath, and he is alone in a cave.

Psalm 142

Read Verses 1-4

What words does David use to communicate how he is praying to God?

Cry out, plead, pour out complaint, tell, say

Looking at the words David uses in the Psalm, what is David feeling as he writes this Psalm? What might be his state of being (emotional/physical/spiritual)?

- Completely desperate/at the end of himself and broken (words from previous question)
- ❖ Fearful & uncertain (v. 4 "they have hidden a trap for me" "no refuge")
- ❖ Exhausted (v. 3 "my spirit faints within me")
- ❖ Alone & hurt (v. 4 "there is none who takes notice of me" "no one cares for my soul")

What are some things that make us feel the way David felt? (use real and hypothetical)

Read Verses 5-7

What hope does David cling to? His relationship with the

Lord. How specifically does this relationship give David hope?

- * Refuge and stability (v. 5 "my refuge")
- ❖ Satisfaction (v. 5 "my portion")
- Comfort (v. 6 "attend to my cry")
- ❖ Hope of practical deliverance from his circumstances (v. 6-7)

What does it mean when David says that God is his refuge and portion?

- **❖** Refuge
 - ➤ Safe, secure, protected
- Portion
 - ➤ Satisfied, provision, complete

Gospel

God is our refuge and portion. Our sin has left us desperate and broken, but God loves us so much that he sent Jesus. Through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, we have hope. Romans 10:9 says, "if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." He becomes our refuge. Nothing can rip us from his loving hands. Our forever is secure in him. Though we will have trouble in this life, we know there is a day with no more pain, no more death, and no more tears. He also becomes our portion. Even if we lose everything and everyone, our hearts are content in Jesus. He promises to never leave us or forsake us. His Holy Spirit dwells in us, so we are never alone.

❖ Who comes to David?

- ➤ His family
- ➤ Everyone in distress, in debt, and bitter in soul (discontented)
- ❖ David ensures the safety of his father and mother
- ❖ He is commanded to leave the stronghold and go to Judah
 - > Stronghold: a place that has been fortified so as to protect it against attack
 - ➤ Judah: they were in danger in Judah (1 Samuel 23:3)
- ❖ Bottom line: God provided community and support for David, but even if he hadn't, David would have been okay because God was his refuge and portion. David was able to be a refuge for others because he first found his refuge and portion in God. God provided community for David, and he sent him forward.

Has there ever been a time where God has come through for you like this?

As David rested in the refuge and portion of God, he became a place of refuge for those in need (distress, in debt, and discontented). How can we be a place of refuge for others?

How can we show respect and care for our parents/elders?

What are some strongholds/safe places that God might call us from, and what "dangerous places" might he call us to?

- ❖ From a friend group to reach out to someone you might not have a prior relationship with
- ❖ From your mapped out future to something you never thought you would do (maybe even vocational ministry)
- ❖ From your bed early on Saturday morning to serve someone else
- ❖ From your easy, surface level conversations to sharing the

Gospel with someone who needs it

Take Home

You might feel as though *there is no one*, but what you need to know and believe is *there is no one* you need other than Jesus. *There is no one* you can find true refuge in other than Jesus. *There is no one* who can satisfy the desire of your heart other than Jesus.

Unbeliever, give your life to Jesus. Find your refuge in him. Be satisfied in him.

Believer, what area of your life are you not resting in God's refuge? Do you live like Jesus is your portion? What strongholds might he be calling you out of? What "dangerous" place might he be calling you to?

Weeks

Searching the Heart of the King

Week 5: It's Called Consequences 1 Samuel 21:1-9, 1 Samuel 22:6-23 & Psalm 52

Context

Earlier in our series, we skipped 1 Samuel 21:1-9. The passage takes place before David goes to Gath and acts crazy. 1 Samuel 21:1-9 gives context to 1 Samuel 22:6-23. 22:6-23 takes place after David is joined by his family and others in the cave and he is sent out from his stronghold to Judah.

This story has a lot of narrative, so it will be a little different from our normal discussions. We are going to move through the entire story together, and then at the end, we will talk through some practical points of application for us.

1 Samuel 21:1-9

Verses 1-2

David lies to Ahimelech because he is clearly not there by order of Saul. He is an enemy of the King. Ahimelech believes him because David had come before by order of Saul.

Verses 3-6

David asks for rations for him and his men. Common bread could be eaten by anyone, but Holy Bread could only be eaten by the priests. Ahimelech is willing to make an exception for David and his men so long as they were "clean." (Israel had many rules to follow on how to stay ceremonially clean). In Mark 2:26, Jesus praises Ahimelech for choosing mercy in this situation

Verse 7

This verse is extremely loaded and it should grab our attention for a few reasons.

- 1. It seems to randomly interject with a random bystander's name.
- 2. He is tightly allied with Saul.
- 3. He is an Edomite.

Does anyone know what is significant about Doeg being an Edomite?

Does anyone know the story of Jacob and Esau?

Jacob would later be named Israel and be the father of the nation of Israel/Israelites. His older brother was named Esau and would become the father of the nation of Edom/Edomites.

The two brothers were destined to be in contention from the womb

The children struggled together within her, and she said, "If it is thus, why is this happening to me?" So she went to inquire of the Lord. And the Lord said to her, "Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples from within you shall be divided; the one shall be stronger than the other, the older shall serve the younger."

Genesis 25:22-24

Esau, as the firstborn son, should have received the blessing and birthright. He sold his birthright to Jacob, and Jacob tricked his father into giving him Esau's blessing.

So Doeg, a descendant of Esau and a loyal servant of Saul, witnessed Ahimelech help David, a descendant of Jacob and an enemy of Saul.

David receives Goliath's spear. He gave it to the Lord, and God gave it back when he needed it.

1 Samuel 22:6-22

Verses 1-9

Saul's spear is in his hand. He is out for blood.

Who is Saul speaking to? (Specifically what tribe/people?)

There was some really bad blood between the tribe of Benjamin and the other tribes of Israel because of what happened in Judges 19-21 (the story is absolutely crazy, and you should go and read it in your spare time).

Saul was not a unifying king, he was trying to appeal to the tribe he was from. He warned them that David would rule harshly against them because of the incident in Judges. He feels betrayed by Jonathan (his son) and his tribe.

Doeg snitched.

(He is called "the Edomite" three times. In Hebrew, the way they emphasized something was by repeating it. 22:9, 18, 22)

Verses 11-15

For the second time in this passage, Saul says why "have you conspired against me?" He is paranoid.

Ahimelech had good reasons for why he helped David and his men, but Saul was so corrupted by paranoia and hate he could not see the truth.

Verses 16-19

Saul commands his servants to put Ahimelech and all of the priests to death, but his servants would not do it. He then turns

to Doeg the Edomite, and Doeg slaughters them all. He then put the entire city of Nob to death.

Extreme Irony

Saul was rejected as king because he failed to put to death completely his wicked enemies, yet here he puts to death an entire city of priests of God. 1 Samuel 15:3 (God's command to Saul against the Amalekites) and 1 Samuel 22:19 (Saul's actions at Nob) have the exact same wording. In 1 Samuel 15:9 Saul disobeys God's command.

Verses 20-23

Abiathar escapes and brings the ephod (High Priest garment) with him (1 Samuel 23:6) signifying the priestly counsel officially moving from Saul to David.

David realizes the consequences of his actions. He owns up to his failure, and he attempts to make right what he can make right by taking in Abiathar.

Application

Sin brings destruction.

David's actions have consequences.

Oftentimes our sins affect more than just us.

What ways have you seen your sin affect other people?

What sins have you excused in your life?

Pride twists judgment.

Saul is so twisted by his own pride and insecurity, he is unwilling to put to death completely wicked and evil people, but he is willing to slaughter innocent people. How has pride and/or insecurity twisted your judgment?

Psalm 52

Verses 1-9

After reading the story, it's easy to feel frustrated and saddened by evil. This Psalm is a prayer of passion against evil.

Gospel

In this Psalm, we are reminded that evil will not prevail. Evil will be punished either in eternity or on the cross. Because of Jesus, we can confidently say Psalm 52:9, "I will thank you forever because you have done it."

Looking at this world and all of the evil in it leaves us disturbed, discouraged, and totally hopeless, but when we look at it through the lens of what Jesus secured for us through his death and resurrection, we have unending hope.

Week 6

1. Read chapter to yourself and make notes. -Observe patterns, repeated themes, big ideas, questions, thoughts, Gospel pictures, application, etc. 2. Reread each section as a group. Stop to discuss notes and application questions.
